Mt Tamborine outing, 5 Sep

It was a long day! The coach was late due to traffic problems. It was guiet on the bus, perhaps everybody was snoozing.

Arriving at Gallery Walk, some members stretched their legs and walked to the rainforest. Unfortunately, they walked further than planned and ended

up at Curtis Falls: a LONG walk away. I was glad to see them again safe and sound.

Everybody else split up and went their own way at the Eagle Heights shops.

Our next stop was at the Tamborine Mountain Coffee Plantation which was interesting and educational. The plantation won the 2019 Golden Bean Award for Australian/New Zealandgrown Coffee (milk-based).

The skins of the dried fruit of coffee berries, rich in antioxidants, make cascara.

The seeds go through a process from raw to dried before being ready to grind. The pulper removes the skins and the remaining seeds are dried in a shed for up to 8 weeks.

We tasted single origin coffee: one from Colombia which was very strong, and one from Tamborine which was much weaker.

Lunch was next and we were entertained by two beautiful St Bernard dogs who live on the premises. It was a beautiful day and the view of the surrounding countryside was wonderful.

Finally, replete and glad to get on the coach again, we arrived at Cost: \$67.00

the Yatala Pie Shop to buy a pie for dinner - as if we needed more food. Once more, there was quiet on the bus as our driver negotiated the traffic and got us safely back to Brisbane.

Next outing: Queensland **Pioneer Steam Railway** (QPSR)



This will be our last outing in 2024, and I hope it will attract a few more men!

He bought me a bass guitar for Christmas that year. This led to us joining the local neighbourhood band, No Strings Attached. I was off and running with my list.


But for many of the things I wanted to pursue, I needed to learn new skills and fortunately I found U3A.

Profile: Newsletter editor Josephine Brown



"Hey! Let's join U3A and learn how to play the ukulele," a friend suggested, back in 2009.

"Nah. Don't think so," I said. But she just tightened the thumbscrews of friendship, so I bought my first uke and met the inspiring tutor and uke-collector Garold Simmers.

He taught us how to play chords, and we quickly discovered that you can't play only chords forever. You have to SING along with the chords.
